What will I do as a Registered Nurse?

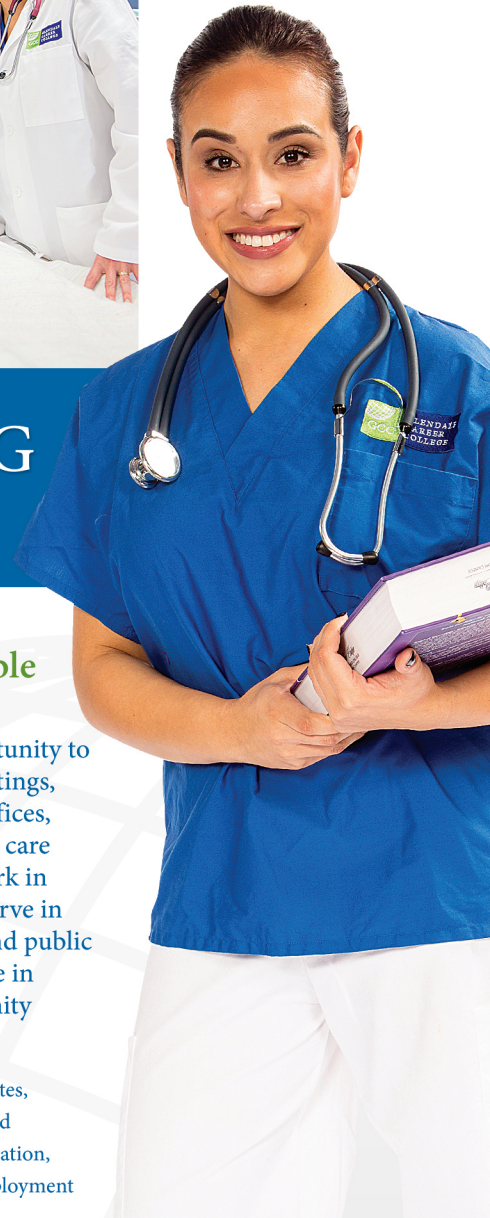
Registered Nurses (RNs) are the largest group among all the health care occupations. RNs provide and coordinate patient care, educate patients and the public about various health conditions, and provide advice and emotional support to patients and their family members.

The Associate of Arts in Nursing Program provides students with the opportunity to develop the knowledge and skills necessary to function as a Registered Nurse in a variety of settings. Students enrolled in this program receive classroom, laboratory, and clinical instruction in nursing areas of fundamentals, anatomy and physiology, pharmacology, medical/surgical nursing, mental health, obstetrics, and pediatric nursing.

What careers are available after I graduate?

Registered Nurses have the opportunity to work in a variety of healthcare settings, including hospitals, physicians' offices, home healthcare services, nursing care facilities and more. Some RNs work in schools or outpatient clinics, or serve in the military, while home health and public health nurses provide nursing care in patients' homes, schools, community centers, and other sites.
